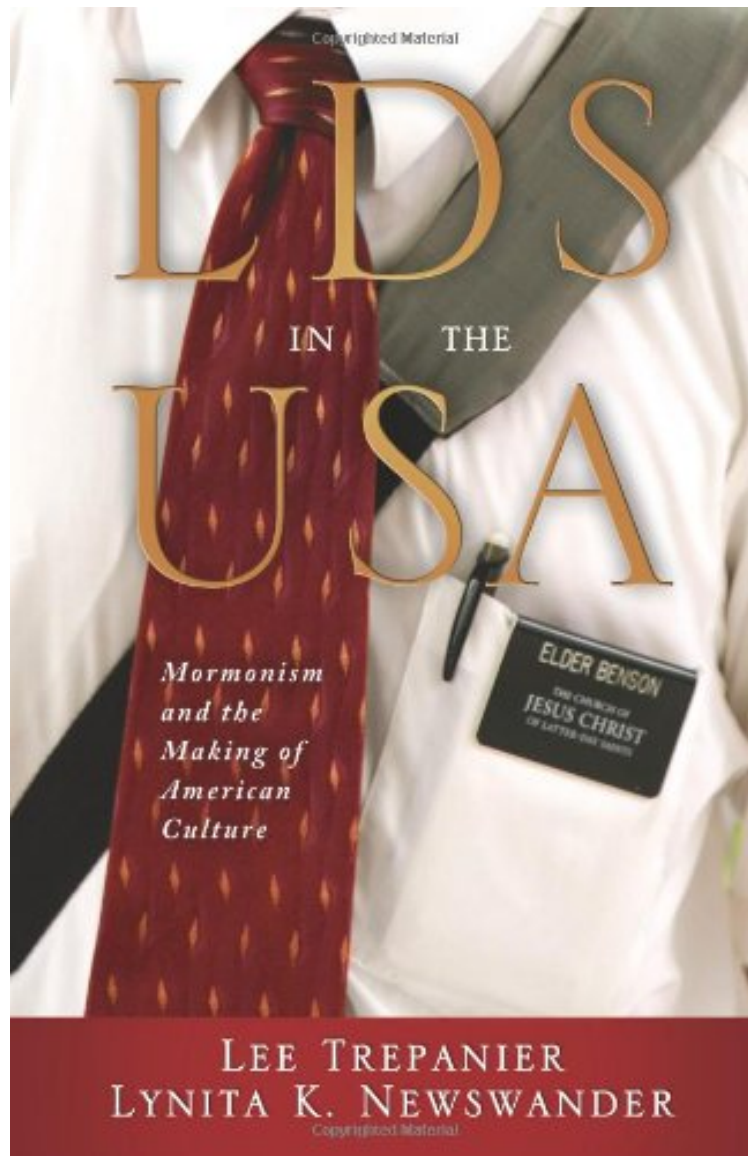

Details matter By Michael Morris I cannot provide a review of the entire book, which I have not completed. But when the "largest branch" of Mormonism is misidentified in the introduction as "The Church of Latter-day Saints" instead of its actual name "The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints," I cannot help but question the credibility of the authors and editors. For a book that claims to correct misconceptions about Mormons and the "LDS Church," beginning by removing the name "Jesus Christ" from the name of the church is not a good beginning. I look forward to reading the book in its entirety as their project seems interesting. And I only hope this initial factual error is not the first of many.
