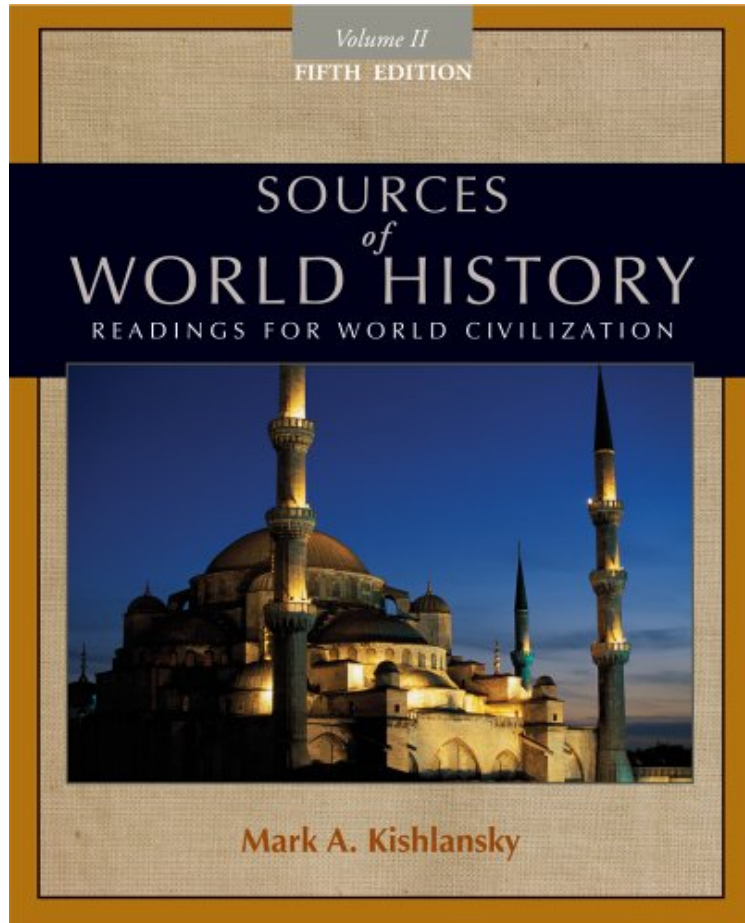

Professor Kishlansky is a specialist on seventeenth-century English political history and has written, among other works, *A MONARCHY TRANSFORMED*, *THE RISE OF THE NEW MODEL ARMY*, and *PARLIAMENTARY SELECTION: SOCIAL AND POLITICAL CHOICE IN EARLY MODERN ENGLAND*. From 1984 to 1991 he was editor of the *JOURNAL OF BRITISH STUDIES*. He is currently writing a history of the reign of Charles I entitled *THE DEATH OF KINGS*.
