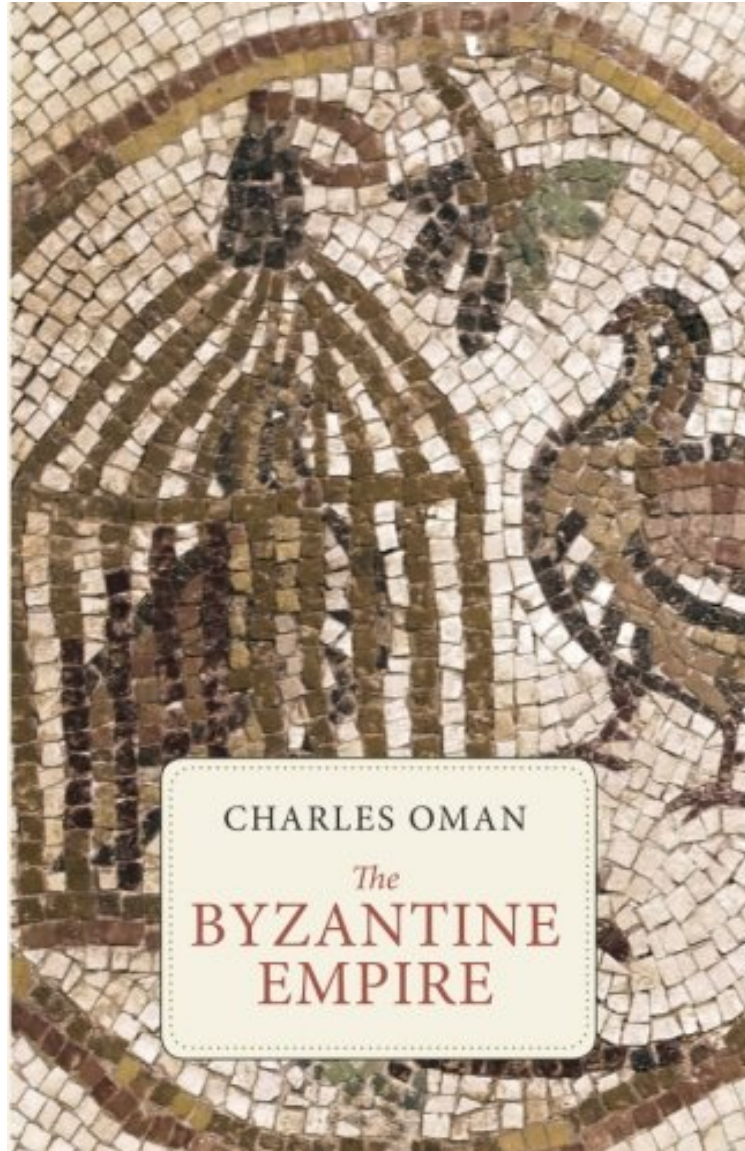

This history of the Byzantines isn't very long (it says almost 4,700 locations, but only about 3500 of actual history), but I found it to be a very interesting summary of the Eastern Roman Empire. The fall of Byzantium is tragic, as the city was left alone. It really makes it clear what a debt the West owes to the Greeks of Byzantium. Easy to recommend if you like history.

Using clear and eminently readable prose, Charles Oman describes the rise and fall of a great empire. He begins with the founding of Byzantium by Greek colonists, traces its rise to power and eventual elevation to peer of Rome (and rechristening as Constantinople "the City of Constantine"), and explains the underpinnings of the gradual decline and eventual conquest of the city by the Ottomans. Oman was an early apologist for the Byzantines, and sought to refute the reputation of degeneracy and weakness that had been given to that civilization by prior historians.

About the Author Sir Charles W.C. Oman (1860-1946) was a noted scholar of medieval and military history. Among his eminent works are *A History of the Art of War in the Middle Ages* and *Warwick the Kingmaker*.
