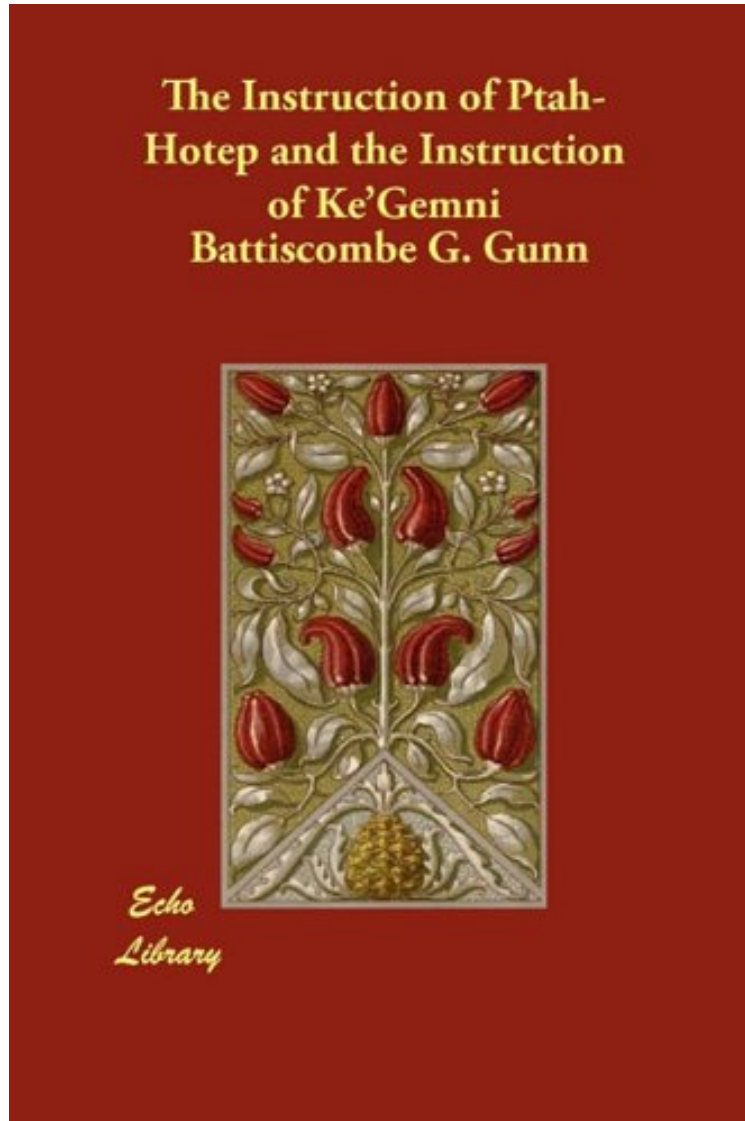

If you are an adult, with a self-examined life experience of moral reasoning, you won't learn anything new from Ptah Hotep. However, that it is the oldest book still in print, and may inscribe your personal moral code, validated by a sage of ancient ages - means it is worth reading, makes it a 'keeper' for your library. A definition of "sanity" is: reality commonly experienced. This book, if you agree with its prescriptions, will provide you with the comfort of being in the lived majority of any time. While I am hesitant to condone majority morality, here presented is Common Sense Morality, subjectively derived from living in society, four thousand years ago, and still valid today.
